## AUDIENCE UNDERSTANDING SURVEY: POST-DEBATE VOTE CHOICE

## JULY 2024

In a survey launched days after the first presidential debate, we asked a national sample of white women who they would vote for if the presidential election were held today. This point-in-time "pulse check" survey was analyzed with particular attention to our audience of ideologically moderate women to better understand their opinions on key issues and current events.

## KEY OPINION QUESTION \#1

If the 2024 presidential election were held today, who would you vote for if the candidates were Joe Biden (the Democrat) and Donald Trump (the Republican)?

- Joe Biden, the Democrat
- Donald Trump, the Republican
- Another candidate
- Don't know
- Not going to vote/wouldn't vote if those were the choices


## TOPLINE TAKEAWAYS

- Among ideologically moderate white women, Biden (34.1\%) and Trump (34.4\%) poll neck and neck.
- For comparison, over $70 \%$ of liberal white women said they will vote for Biden, and over $70 \%$ of conservative white women said they will vote for Trump.
- $7.6 \%$ of moderate white women said they would vote for another candidate.

Responses were similar among liberal white women (6.3\%) and conservative white women (4.2\%).

- $14 \%$ of moderate white women said they would not vote. Responses were similar among liberal white women (4\%) and conservative white women (4.1\%).
- $10 \%$ of moderate white women said they don't know who they will vote for, compared to $3.5 \%$ of liberal white women and $5.4 \%$ of conservative white women.
- Looking at partisanship, votes fall predictably across party lines, with most Democrats choosing Biden, most Republicans choosing Trump, and Independents showing a split between the two. Notably, however, over a quarter of Independent white women had a "won't vote" response (27.4\%). This surpassed the percentages for both Biden (26.7\%) and Trump (23.6\%). Only 2.7\% of Democrats and $2.7 \%$ of Republicans gave a "won't vote" response.
- Across the three age groups, Biden did best with ages 55+ (44.4\%), compared to $30.3 \%$ of ages 18-34 and $30.9 \%$ of ages 35-54.
- Trump did best with ages 35-54 (41.2\%).
- Ages 18-34 had the highest percentage of "won't vote" responses (18.5\%), followed by ages 35-54 (13.6\%) and ages 55+ (6.6\%).
- Looking at household incomes, the lowest income bracket, $\mathbf{\$ 0} \mathbf{- \$ 4 9 k}$, had a considerably higher percentage of "won't vote" responses (15.7\%) compared to 4.8\% of $\$ 50 \mathrm{k}-\$ 99 \mathrm{k}$ and $4 \%$ of $\$ 100 \mathrm{k}+$.
- A similar trend can be seen when looking at urbanicity and education. Rural white women had a higher percentage of "won't vote" responses (15.6\%) than suburban (9.9\%) and urban (7.4\%) white women, as did women with a high school education or less (22\%) when compared to women with some college (9.4\%) or a college degree (3.3\%).


## KEY OPINION QUESTION \#2

We also asked the question in a slightly different way, naming three additional candidates and eliminating the option of "Not going to vote/wouldn't vote if those were the choices."

If November's general election for president were held today, whom would you support if the candidates are:

- Joe Biden, the Democrat
- Donald Trump, the Republican
- Robert F. Kennedy, Jr., an Independent
- Cornel West, an Independent
- Jill Stein, the Green Party candidate
- Don't know


## Response Counts (Full Sample)

Looking at responses from all white women surveyed, Biden and Trump poll similarly, with $35 \%$ of responses going to Biden and 36\% of responses going to Trump. Among the three alternate candidates listed, Robert F. Kennedy, Jr. (10\%) beat out both Cornel West (1\%) and Jill Stein (1\%). 18\% of respondents stated that they did not know who they would vote for.

## Responses by Ideology

Among moderate white women, percentages are similar between Joe Biden (32\%) and Donald Trump (30\%). Moderate women show the highest percentage of being undecided (22\%) as well as voting for Robert F. Kennedy, Jr. (14\%) when compared to their liberal and conservative peers.
