

TRACKING SURVEY: WAVE FIVE September 2024

One For All is running the final three waves of a multi-wave tracking survey started by <u>Galvanize Action</u>. Multiple waves of surveys will be given to the same group of white women across ten states: WI, PA, OH, MI, ME, NE, AZ, NV, MT, and FL. (See previous memos for <u>June</u> <u>(Baseline)</u>, <u>July (Wave Two)</u>, <u>early August (Wave Three)</u>, and <u>Late August (Wave Four)</u> survey results.) Some of the questions will be the same in each survey so we can watch changes over time. Other questions will be different from wave to wave to capture insights into important current events and pivotal moments in this year's civic and political landscape. This survey was fielded ten days after the presidential debate between Kamala Harris and Donald Trump. The questions were the same as those asked by Galvanize Action in June and again in early August.

A majority (78%) of the respondents in this month's survey are in our audience of ideologically-moderate women. Results were analyzed with particular attention to this group of women.

TOPLINE TAKEAWAYS FOR MODERATE WOMEN

- Looking only at responses from ideologically-moderate white women (n= 6,284), they continue to select the economy as their top vote choice issue.
 - 35% selected economy
 - 18% selected preserving democracy
 - 14% selected immigration
 - 11% selected abortion
 - 7% selected healthcare

TOPLINE TAKEAWAYS FOR MODERATE WOMEN

- 48% of moderate white women said they would only vote for a presidential candidate who will take action to protect abortion for everyone.
 - 31% strongly agree
 - 17% somewhat agree
 - 22% neither agree nor disagree
 - 10% somewhat disagree
 - 20% strongly disagree

TOPLINE TAKEAWAYS FOR MODERATE WOMEN

- 57% of moderate white women blame the Biden/Harris administration for inflation somewhat or to a great extent.
 - 41% say they blame the current administration to a great extent.
 - \circ 16% say they somewhat blame the current administration.
 - 23% say they blame the Biden/Harris administration very little.
 - 20% say they do not blame the current administration at all.
- When we asked this question in our <u>June survey</u> (fielded June 10, 2024, when President Biden was the Democratic candidate), the wording was "Biden Administration" vs. the current survey that asked about the "Biden/Harris Administration."

TOPLINE TAKEAWAYS FOR MODERATE WOMEN

- 46% of moderate white women believe Republicans are better for the economy; 34% believe Democrats are better.
 - 33% say the Republican party is much better
 - 13% say the Republican party is somewhat better
 - 20% say neither party is better
 - 13% the Democratic party is somewhat better
 - 21% say the Democratic party is much better

TOPLINE TAKEAWAYS FOR MODERATE WOMEN

- Looking only at responses from ideologically-moderate white women (n= 6,284), it is very close between Harris and Trump.
 - 45% the Democrat
 - $\circ~~$ 43% the Republican
 - 3% another candidate
 - 7% don't know
 - 2% not going to vote
- When we asked this question in our <u>June survey</u> (fielded June 10, 2024, President Biden was the Democratic candidate).

- Audience: White Women in WI, PA, OH, MI, ME, NE, AZ, NV, MT, and FL
- Sample size: 8,006
- Date in field: September 20, 2024
- Margin of error: +/- 1.42
