

The One For All Committee ran the final three waves of a multi-wave tracking survey started by <u>Galvanize Action</u>. Multiple waves of surveys were given to the same group of white women across ten states: WI, PA, OH, MI, ME, NE, AZ, NV, MT, and FL. (See previous memos for <u>June</u> <u>(Baseline)</u>, <u>July (Wave Two)</u>, <u>early August (Wave Three)</u>, <u>late August (Wave Four)</u>, and <u>September (Wave Five)</u> survey results.) Some of the questions were the same in each survey so we could watch changes over time. Other questions were different from wave to wave to capture insights into important current events and pivotal moments in this year's civic and political landscape. This survey was fielded 11 days before Election Day. The questions were the same as those asked by Galvanize Action in June, early August, and September.

A majority (79%) of the respondents in this month's survey are in our audience of ideologically-moderate women. Results were analyzed with particular attention to this group of women.

## TOPLINE TAKEAWAYS FOR MODERATE WOMEN

- Looking only at responses from ideologically-moderate white women (n= 6,263), they continue to select the economy as their top vote choice issue.
  - 34% selected economy
  - 19% selected preserving democracy
  - 15% selected immigration
  - 13% selected abortion
  - 6% selected healthcare

## TOPLINE TAKEAWAYS FOR MODERATE WOMEN

- 48% of moderate white women said they would only vote for a presidential candidate who will take action to protect abortion for everyone.
  - 31% strongly agree
  - 17% somewhat agree
  - 23% neither agree nor disagree
  - 8% somewhat disagree
  - 21% strongly disagree

## TOPLINE TAKEAWAYS FOR MODERATE WOMEN

- 45% of moderate white women believe Republicans are better for the economy; 35% believe Democrats are better.
  - 33% say the Republican party is much better
  - o 12% say the Republican party is somewhat better
  - 20% say neither party is better
  - $\circ$  13% the Democratic party is somewhat better
  - 22% say the Democratic party is much better

## EDUCATION LEVEL

Looking at responses by education level, 53% of white women with a four-year college degree or higher said they would vote for the Democratic candidate, Kamala Harris, over 39% who said they would vote for Trump. In contrast, 47% of white women without a four-year degree said they would vote for the Republican candidate, Donald Trump, over 44% who said they would vote for Harris.

## TOPLINE TAKEAWAYS FOR MODERATE WOMEN

- Looking only at responses from ideologically-moderate white women (n= 6,263), it is very close between Harris and Trump.
  - 45% the Democrat
  - 44% the Republican
  - 3% another candidate
  - 5% don't know
  - 2% not going to vote

## EDUCATION LEVEL

Looking at responses by education level, 52% of white women with a four-year college degree or higher said they would vote for the Democratic Senate candidate over 37% who said they would vote for the Republican. In contrast, 47% of white women without a four-year degree said they would vote for the Republican Senate candidate over 38% who said they would vote for the Democrat.

## TOPLINE TAKEAWAYS FOR MODERATE WOMEN

- Looking only at responses from ideologically-moderate white women, Senate Republicans and Democrats are also neck and neck.
  - 44% the Democrat
  - 43% the Republican
  - 3% another candidate
  - 8% don't know
  - 2% not going to vote
